**B. ATTENDANCE**

1. Policy statement from OSU Catalog:

Class Attendance

General

**Regular class attendance is obligatory.** *An instructor may recommend that a student be dropped from a course for poor achievement due to excessive absence.* A student who is dropped after the deadline for dropping courses may be assigned a grade of E. Students who have two unexcused absences during the first two class meetings of the semester may be dropped from the course at the discretion of the instructor. The instructor or the department offering the course will notify the Registrar of this action. However, students should not assume that they have been dropped from a class just because the first two classes were missed. *It is ultimately the responsibility of students to drop a course that they are not planning to attend by the deadline published in the Official College Calendar. Failure to do this may result in a failing grade for the course.*

#### GOLDEN RULES OF LANGUAGE LEARNING

1. **The only thing that matters is How** you say it or write it in French; nobody will ask Why. Play the game; don't read the rule book.
2. **Consistency.** Practice during several short periods (15 – 30 mins.) each day. Two or three hours of cramming for a test is generally useless.
3. **Use it or lose it.** Start with some review, then move into new(er) material
4. **Personalize.** take it out of the book and put it into your own life context. BUT- you don't have to "tell the truth." If you can't say exactly what you want to say in French, just say something appropriate in French.... Use your imagination; or even lie!
5. **Contextualize.** Memorization may be the first step, but if you don't put it into sentences it won't help much.
6. **I'm already telling you the easiest way; it's labor intensive.** I will tell you if there are any tricks or shortcuts.
7. **You play like you practice;** the French word for "practice" is *répétition!*
8. **Repetition** is the most successful learning habit.
9. **The more you know the easier it gets.**
10. **If you keep doing what you've been doing, you'll keep getting what you've been getting.** Doing well? Keep doing what you've been doing. Problems? Address the issues and change your work habits accordingly. Ask me for suggestions.
