REGISTRATION METHODS

Registration for All Returning Oswego Students:

•Web Registration System (myOswego) for returning students:

You will need to use a computer with internet access.

 3. Select "Registration" from the menu.
 4. Check your HOLDS to confirm that you are able to register.

 6. Follow the directions to select classes.
 7. Please submit changes and check your current schedule. Correct any registration errors before exiting.

You will need to use a computer with internet access. You will be required to use your Social Security number to web register, if you do not want to use your Social Security number, please register by mail, fax or in person. Please note that high school students should not use online registration, they need approval from Admissions.

Late registrants are charged a fee to register.

Matriculated students may register without additional fees until June 30, 2009.
New students may register until the first day of the semester without additional fees.

HOLDS

All students are required to read and affirm commitment to abide by the Code of Conduct. You can read this information online and then either respond online or on the registration form. Students are required to do this one time only. If you have not done so already, please read and respond before trying to register.

NYS law mandates that all students be informed about Meningococcal Meningitis and have an opportunity to decide whether to receive immunization. You can read this information online and answer the questions online or on the registration form. You need to give a date of prior immunization or decline immunization. Once the questions are answered the Registration Hold will be lifted immediately.

In addition to the Meningitis requirement the college also has a Measles Mumps Rubella (MMR) immunization requirement. Before attending classes students must provide proof of immunization to MMR. Information about this is available on the Walker Health Center web page. The two exceptions to the requirement are; students who were born before 1957; and students who are enrolled exclusively in Distance Learning courses. Failure to comply with this requirement will result in a student's interim suspension from the college and termination of their student status.

The Student Accounts Office requires that students accept their charges before registration can occur. If you choose not to accept your charges, registration on the web will not be allowed.

The Parking Office and other offices place holds that will stop you from registering. Please check your holds online at myoswego.oswego.edu before attempting to register.

ADVANCED REGISTRATION:

April 2-April 24, 2009

Students matriculated at Oswego State for Spring 2009 are eligible to take advantage of Advanced Registration.

Matriculated Graduate Students are eligible to register beginning the first day of Advanced Registration.

Matriculated Undergraduate Students are sent an email, to their Oswego email address, notifying them when they can go on their myOswego account to check registration information. Students can check their major, class standing, holds affecting registration, and their appointment start time.

Readmitted Students approved for the Fall 2009 semester may begin registering April 27, 2009. Readmitted students are not allowed to register until they have met the advisement requirements of their school/department. Please refer to your readmittance acceptance letter for details.

Note: Registration is restricted for all first semester juniors (57-71 sh) first semester transfers and all spring 2009 admitted freshman until you see your advisor.

CONTINUING REGISTRATION:

April 25-June 30, 2009

Some major restrictions are lifted at the beginning of Continuing Registration.

All registered students may try to add courses that were previously restricted to them.

Matriculated Undergraduate Students must register by June 30, 2009 or incur a late fee of \$40.00.

Non-matriculated students can begin registering for classes on May 4, 2009.

LATE REGISTRATION:

July 1-August 30, 2009

Matriculated undergraduate students who have not processed any registration: Will have to fill out a *Permit to Late Register Form* through the Registrar's Office. You may contact the Registrar's Office (315-312-2136 or registra@oswego.edu) any time during Late Registration to get your *Permit to Late Register Form* processed. Once your *Permit to Late Register Form* has been processed you will be able to register online.

Important: Students requesting permission to late register will be charged a \$40.00 late registration fee.

Graduate students and non-matriculated undergraduate students have until 5 BUSINESS DAYS AFTER THE FIRST CLASS MEETING to register by paper registration form. Payment is due at the time of registration.

Note: Registrations Submitted After the 5 Day Deadline Will be Charged a Late ADD Fee of \$20.00.

Program Adjustments (Add/Drops*):

Adds: August 31-September 10, 2009

Drops: August 31-September 21, 2009

Departments determine which of their courses are available for add/drop. Most courses can be added and dropped on the web. A small group can only be added with an online override or a program adjustment form. It is to your advantage to try to do your program adjustments on the web as it will cut down or eliminate your having to go to each instructor and get their signature. Please use the program adjustment form only when signatures are required.

Instructions for using a Program Adjustment Form:

For classes that a student must (or chooses) to use a program adjustment form, please be sure to fill out the top of the form completely. List all courses to be added and/or all courses to be dropped. Secure each instructor's signature and the last date of attendance (for drops) for all classes. Bring the form to the Registrar's Office by the posted Add/Drop deadlines.

***Note:** Graduate students must use the *ADD/DROP Form* beginning 8/31/2009.

To **DROP** a course you need the instructor's signature with last date of attendance.

To **ADD** a course you need the instructor's signature if the course is closed.

PART-TIME STUDENTS: FEE Liability begins AUGUST 31. Courses dropped on the web from August 31 through DROP period will incur fee liability.

Matriculated Graduate Students

Registration for matriculated graduate students begins at 7:30 am, Thursday, April 2, 2009.

Matriculated Undergraduate Students

You may begin registering for courses according to the chart below. You may register for courses anytime after the date and time that corresponds to the number of credit hours you have completed, excluding the current semester. You are not limited to that exact time, it is a starting time.

Readmitted students may begin registering Monday, April 27, 2009.

Non-Matriculated Students

Registration for both graduate and undergraduate non-matriculated students begins Monday, May 4, 2009.

Matriculated Seniors

As a senior, you have registration priority to select courses before the juniors, sophomores, and freshmen. Your senior year priority is guaranteed when you register for classes at the time you first become eligible. If you register after that time, you will lose the opportunity to have priority selection of classes.

COURSE WITHDRAWAL GUIDELINES

Matriculated Undergraduate:

The last day to drop a semester course without liability is August 30, 2009. Students may continue to drop on the web through September 21, 2009, but there is fee liability beginning August 30.

Course withdrawal from September 22 through October 30, 2009 must be done on a *Withdrawal Form* with the necessary signatures and there is a \$20 fee.

A grade of WP will be assigned by the instructor if the student is passing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WF will be assigned by the instructor if the student is failing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WN will be assigned by the instructor if no grade has been established at the time of filing of the form. These grades are not used to calculate a GPA, but the hours are counted as hours for which the student was enrolled that semester.

Course withdrawal from November 2-December 11, 2009 may be petitioned if a student believes that their circumstances are extraordinary (poor performance in a course is *not* an extraordinary circumstance). It must be done on a *Late Documented Withdrawal Form*, have the necessary signatures, have documentation (e.g., a health care provider's verification of student illness [physical or psychological] or of major illness of immediate family member; copy of obituary, listing relationship of deceased to student, letter from student's employer) submitted with the form and there is a \$20 fee.

A grade of WP will be assigned by the instructor if the student is passing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WF will be assigned by the instructor if the student is failing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WN will be assigned by the instructor if no grade has been established at the time of filing of the form. These grades are not used to calculate a GPA, but the hours are counted as hours for which the student was enrolled that semester.

Matriculated Graduate:

The last day to drop a semester course without liability is August 30, 2009. You may continue to drop courses through September 21, 2009, using an *ADD/DROP Form* with instructor signature. There will be fee liability unless you never attended and the instructor writes "never attended" on the *ADD/DROP Form*.

Drops done from September 22 through October 30, 2009 must be completed on an *ADD/DROP Form* and be signed by the Graduate Dean. There will be a \$20 fee and some liability.

Fall 2009 Final Examination Schedule

Final examinations will be given in your regular classroom according to the following schedule. The schedule is based on the day of the week the class first meets and the time of day that it meets. Final examinations for courses that have a zero (0) credit discussion and/or laboratory section will be given according to the schedule for the lecture section.

1. Examination time and date for classes that meet on an irregular schedule will be according to the schedule for the first period during which the class begins. For example, a class that meets on Monday, 2:00-4:45 p.m., is to follow the schedule for Monday at 1:50 because the class begins during this period. These exams may have adjusted times because of conflicts, always consult your instructor.

2. Mathematics and Economics departmental common final examinations will be given on Monday, May 11, 8:00 - 10:00 am. Your instructors will announce the place.

3. Classes that meet only one day a week will have their exams scheduled in the regular class time when there is no conflict, times may be adjusted, consult your instructor.

Exam Schedule with times and rooms is posted on Registrar's Web Page in early November 2009.

Audit Policy

General Policy - A person is permitted to audit courses without credit if the instructor of the course determines that the person has an acceptable reason for auditing, that the person has sufficient academic background to benefit from the course, and that there is room in the class. The extent of an auditor's participation in class is determined by the instructor. A Permission to Audit form, available in the Office of the Registrar, signed by the instructor, should be submitted to the Office of the Registrar. Audited courses are not entered on transcripts.

Senior Citizens/Audit Policy - For purposes of this policy, a senior citizen is defined as a person 60 years of age or older. A senior citizen desiring to audit a credit course must complete an "Audit Form for Senior Citizens" in consultation with the Division of Extended Learning. Upon approval by the appropriate department chair, the senior citizen will be informed of the procedure for class admission. It is understood, however, that privileges may be limited by the availability of class space. It is also understood that the audit privileges will not regularly be extended in all studio and laboratory courses. There is no fee or any charge levied by the College for the audit privilege. Text books or other related materials may be purchased at the prevailing student price. Senior citizens should register as an auditor during the late registration/add period at the beginning of each semester. Noncredit courses may not be audited as they are not state supported. Senior citizens may, of course, register for such courses upon payment of the regular fees.

Course Work at Other Colleges

Students may, with prior approval, take course work at other accredited colleges and universities and transfer the credit to their record at Oswego. Students who must satisfy the newest general education requirements should note that courses may be taken off-campus in every general education category except Intellectual Issues; the six-credit upper-division requirement in that area must be met with course work at Oswego.

Courses from community colleges will be accepted for lower division credit only. A maximum of 62 semester hours of lower division credit may be applied toward the Oswego bachelor's degree. Credit only is transferred for work taken at other institutions. Off-campus study does not become a part of a student's record unless an Off-Campus Study Approval Form, signed by the student's advisor, chairperson of the department in which the equivalent campus course is taught or, where applicable, the Director of General Education, is submitted to the Registrar's Office in advance of completing the coursework.

Drops at Instructor Discretion

Students who have two unexcused absences during the first two class meetings of the semester, **MAY** be dropped from the course at the discretion of the instructor. The instructor or the department offering the course will notify the Registrar of this action, which terminates a student's registration in that course. However, students should not assume that they have been dropped from a class just because the first two classes were missed. It is ultimately the responsibility of students to drop a course that they are not planning to attend by the deadline published in the college calendar. Failure to do this may result in a failing grade for the course.

Personal Identification Number (PIN)

Your Personal Identification Number or PIN (along with your userid) allows you to access your student records on myOswego. Beginning February 2009, your initial PIN will be mailed to you. Reset PINS will either be emailed to your Oswego email address or mailed to your home address.

If you happen to forget your PIN, you have three options:

1. Come in person with a valid picture I.D. to the Registrar's Office, 301 Culkin Hall.
2. Go online to myOswego and put in your userid then click on 'Forgot PIN'.
3. Call the Registrar's Office, 315-312-2136, and answer your "PIN Hint Question" correctly and your new PIN will be emailed to your Oswego email address.

Under NO circumstances will PIN numbers be given over the phone.

Repeating Grades

Only grades of D+, D, D-, and E can be repeated. Some academic departments require a minimum grade of C- in the courses preceding established sequences and/or all courses in the major. Check with your advisor if you have any grades below C- to make sure you can register for other related courses in the department. For more information on repeated courses see the college catalog or your advisor.

Semester Hour Load

An undergraduate student must carry a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester to be considered a full-time student. An undergraduate student is permitted to take a maximum of 17 credit hours. Exceptions are made for students majoring in Vocational Teacher Preparation, and for graduating seniors (who have filed at the Registrar's Office to graduate the next semester), all of whom may register for up to 18 credit hours and Technology Education majors who may register for 19 credit hours, during the advanced registration period without special written permission. All other students may increase their course load at the beginning of the semester, during the add/drop period, with their Advisor's written permission on an add/drop form.

Time Requirements for Courses

In the Commissioner's Regulations it states that a 3 credit hour course must meet for a total of 2250 minutes. It may be necessary (because of a holiday for example) to schedule an additional class or to add time to each class meeting in order to meet this regulation. If such is necessary, the instructor will inform the class as to how this time will be made up.

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Although students and advisors share the responsibility for the student's progress toward a degree, it is the student who is ultimately obligated to understand and fulfill these requirements. Students are responsible for meeting with advisors, who are assigned by major departments, or, in the case of undeclared students, the COMPASS, 142 Campus Center. It is important for all new students to meet with advisors as soon as possible to plan programs carefully. The program is supervised by the Council of General Education. Please address all questions and paperwork to: Dr. Christopher LaLonde, gened@oswego.edu.

NOTES:

- General Education courses may not be taken pass/fail.
 - One course can be used to satisfy two (or more) requirements, except that: **No course satisfying the American History requirement will at the same time satisfy the Tolerance and Intolerance requirement (in Human Diversity).**
 - Courses that satisfy requirements for the major or minor can also satisfy General Education requirements.
 - General Education courses (with the exception of Intellectual Issues) can be taken off-campus, as long as approval is secured in advance.
 - Passing scores on college-level competency exams (e.g., Advanced Placement or CLEP) may be used to earn credits and, where appropriate, satisfy General Education requirements.
 - Waiver exams are given at least twice each year for Computer and Information Literacy (passing this exam satisfies a requirement but earns no credits for the student). Open to new students only.
 - Math competency must be demonstrated by the student before he or she enrolls in any math course numbered 106/206 at Oswego.
 - Up-to-date information about the program, including lists of approved courses, dates of waiver exams, etc., is available on the General Education web page: www.oswego.edu/gened/
- Students who matriculated at Oswego or another SUNY unit prior to 2000 should contact their advisor for General Education requirements.
