

## **Employer Survey**

The SUNY Oswego School of Education **Employer Survey** is a 25-item instrument used to measure employer's perception of the preparation of our completers. The survey was re-developed in 2019 with the question set being similar to the Alumni and Exit Survey in an effort to study the effectiveness from the perspective of multiple stakeholders.

These data were collected during Fall 2019 and Spring 2020. Invitations were sent to school districts where the School of Education holds a formal Professional Development partnership. A deployment of the survey across all of our completers' employers in New York State is scheduled for Fall 2020. However, note that the COVID-19 pandemic may impact this scheduled data collection.
