What does it mean to be a SUNY Oswego Sexpert?

SUNY Oswego Sexperts are students who have extensive training on the topic of sexual and reproductive health and share that information with their peers through outreach, presentations, and other on campus events.

Some important things that you should know:

• The Sexperts program is volunteer based

Students are expected to give the time that they can. Training and meetings are mandatory. Presentations are scheduled based on student availability.

- You are required to participate in training sessions to prepare you to present. Here is how it works:
 - Training

Training is mandatory. In training you will learn important information about sexual and reproductive health, facilitation skills, participate in team building and other fun activities.

• Bi-weekly meetings

You will be required to attend bi-weekly meetings with fellow Sexperts. At these meetings, you will debrief programs, discuss upcoming events and programs, continuing education, and more.

• Presentations

Requests will come in via online form and the Intern will reach out and coordinate presenters for each program. We average about 10 programs each semester.

• Outreach

Thoughout the semester, Sexperts will be asked to participate in various events and programs, as well as the creativity to create their own outreach events (videos, posters, tabling, etc.)

Expectations

Sexperts are expected to act as a positive role model for the program and SUNY Oswego at all times. While understanding that all students are human, there is an expectation that Sexperts are an administrative extension of the college and are encouraged to maintain a positive and healthy pattern of behavior while enrolled in the program. In all cases, the instructor(s) reserve the right to dismiss a student from the program based upon a Sexpert's performance inside and outside of the program. There is a GPA requirement that all Sexperts must meet which is approximately a 2.5.

We will also check with the Office of the Dean of Students/Conduct to see that each student is in good standing. "Good standing" includes a requirement that all matters pending before the Office of

Student Conduct have been fully and finally resolved (including, but not limited to, full satisfaction of any sanctions imposed). Students who are not in good standing are not eligible to participate in certain leadership opportunities.

Commitment

Sexperts are expected to make a full semester commitment.
